#### **Subgrant Agreement**

This Subgrant Agreement ("Agreement") is made and entered into by and between **Delaware County Community Corrections** ("DCCC"), which operates a Community Corrections program in Delaware County, Indiana established pursuant to Indiana Code 11-12, and **Ball State University** ("Ball State"), an Indiana state-assisted institution of higher education, located in Muncle, Indiana. In consideration of the mutual covenants, obligations and stipulations set forth herein, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. Purpose of Grant and Source of Funds: The purpose of this Agreement is to enable DCCC to issue a subgrant to Ball State under DCCC's prime grant award from the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, under the Justice and Mental Health Collaboration Program, CFDA #16.745. To the extent applicable to Ball State's scope of work or to Ball State's status as a subgrantee, Ball State agrees to comply with the Special Conditions of the DCCC prime grant, which are attached hereto, marked Attachment A, and made a part hereof.
- 2. Scope of Work: Ball State, through Dr. Monte Staton, Department of Criminal Justice and Criminology, will participate in the project funded by the DCCC prime grant by performing the services described in the Scope of Work, marked Attachment B, attached hereto and made a part hereof.
- 3. Duration of Project and Termination: The time period for Project activities shall begin on December 31, 2015 and shall end on June 30, 2016. In no event shall payments be made for work done or service performed after the expiration date. This Agreement may be terminated with or without cause by either party before its expiration date by sending the other party written notice via certified mail, return receipt requested, at least ten (10) days prior to the date of termination. Upon receipt of such notice from DCCC to Ball State, no new or additional liabilities payable by DCCC shall be incurred without DCCC's prior written approval. Ball State will be reimbursed for all costs and incurred through the date of termination and for any non-cancelable commitments that are incurred as of the date of the receipt of a notice of termination and which Ball State is unable to cancel through good faith efforts.
- 4. Grant Amount and Payment: The amount of funds that DCCC will reimburse to Ball State for fulfilling the terms of this Agreement shall not exceed \$12,100. DCCC agrees to reimburse Ball State for all actual costs incurred in the performance of the work up to, but not exceeding the maximum specified herein. Invoices may be sent, not more frequently than monthly, to DCCC's "Administrative Contact" identified in the Section on "Notices." The expenditure of grant funds is to follow the budget which is attached hereto, marked Attachment C, and made a part of this Agreement. Deviations from line items in the budget which are greater than 10% require prior approval from DCCC.
- 5. Intellectual Property and Confidentiality: All deliverables shall be and remain the property of DCCC for the benefit of the State of Indiana. DCCC agrees to, and hereby grants a license to Ball State, for use, disclosure and publication of the deliverables, including all data, reports, and other information created, obtained or assembled by Ball State in connection with the Project, as necessary or desirable for any purpose consistent with Ball State's status as a public institution of higher education, such as instructional use and scholarly and professional publications and presentations; provided, however, that no individually identifiable client information may be disclosed by Ball State or any persons under Ball State's control without the prior written consent of an authorized official of DCCC. Any use of client data shall be in accordance with directives of the Indiana Judicial Center and/or the Department of Corrections as well as the privacy provisions of applicable regulations, including but not limited to 42 CFR, Part 2. DCCC agrees to give Ball State proper attribution for creating the deliverables in connection with all uses of the deliverables.
- 6. IRB Review, Approval and Compliance: Under Federal regulations, research is defined as "...a systematic investigation, including research development, testing and evaluation, designed to develop or contribute to generalizable knowledge." (45 CFR 46.102 (d)). A human subject is defined as "...a living individual about whom an investigator (whether professional or student) conducting research obtains (1) Data through intervention or interaction with the individual, or (2) Identifiable private information." (45 CFR 46.102 (f)). Ball State University (BSU) as a Federally Assured Institution (FWA # 00000797), has agreed to apply, and follow, all of the rules and regulations pertaining to human subjects research. BSU's Institutional Review Board (IRB) is the group officially tasked with reviewing, approving and ensuring compliance with these regulations, as well as applicable state laws and institutional human subjects protection policies.

I am providing the attached supplemental proposal for the Gateway Enhancement project located at SR-332 and Nebo Road for your review and consideration.

Since the production of the Preliminary Field Check 30% plans in August of 2015, several meetings have taken place with the design committee and County Commissioners, which have led to modifications to the project parcel size and location.

The project parcel size has enlarged from 0.34 acres to 1.0 acres, and the position of the sign wall has shifted roughly 125' to the west. These modifications have created the need for the following additional services:

#### BOARD OF COMMISSIONER, DELAWARE COUNTY, INDIANA Ordinance No. 2016-\_\_00 U

ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING MATERIALITY POLICY AS TO REPORTING TO INDIANA STATE BOARD OF ACCOUNTS AS TO ERRONEOUS OR IRREGULA: MATERIAL VARIANCES, LOSSES, SHORTAGES OR THEFTS

WHEREAS, Indiana Code § 5-11-1-27(j) states:

"All erroneous or irregular material variances, losses, shortages, or thefts of political subdivision funds or property shall be reported immediately to the state board of accounts. For all material variances, losses, shortages, or thefts, the state board of accounts shall:

- (1) Determine the amount of funds involved and report the amount to the appropriate government and law enforcement officials;
- (2) Determine the internal control weakness that contributed to or caused the condition; and
- (3) Make written recommendations to the appropriate legislative body or appropriate official overseeing the internal control system

  - or appropriate on the condition; and (A) the method of correcting the condition; and (B) the necessary internal control policies and internal control procedures that must be modified to prevent a recurrence of the condition";

WHEREAS the Indiana State Board of Accounts has ruled that in general, each political subdivision must develop its own policy on materiality because the causes of irregular variances, losses, shortages, and thefts are as broad and varied as the political subdivisions in which the incidents occur.

WHEREAS the Board of Commissioners recognizes that variances, losses, shortages, and thefts may occur. If such an incident occurs, it is the County's policy for the Auditor and Treasurer or such other elected officials and/or employees as becomes aware of the variance, loss, shortage or theft to report the same to the President of the Board of Commissioners and to the Auditor of the County, to be placed on the agenda for resolution at the next Board of Commissioners meeting.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED E COMMISSIONERS OF DELAWARE COUNTY, INDIANA, That: ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF

Section 1: The materiality threshold at which point the Couny shall report incidents of material variances, losses, shortages, or thefts to the State Board of Accounts is:

  A. A one-time cash loss of at least \$1,000 or,

  B. A recurring cash loss of at least \$100 average per month, or,

  C. A value of \$5,000 for a one-time loss of assets, or,

  D. A creation of additional liabilities of at least \$1,000 average per month.
