This is paid through a grant. The dog will help with child victims, trials, juvenile court proceedings. The dog will be the face of Delaware County CASA.

President Quakenbush questioned the price of training the dog.

Mr. David Brown, Sheriff Department, said the Sheriff Department dog cost \$15,000. The responsibility of the dog is of Mr. Brown, but owned by Delaware County Sheriff department. Having the responsibility of the dog is very awarding, Mr. Brown said the dog is housed at his home. The Sheriff Department currently have five (5) active dogs on staff.

President Quakenbush said they were convinced by Mr. Joe Winkle that the position was needed.

Councilman Bledsoe said this position was created during 2017 budget. These discussions usually come with details. Bledsoe does not want to take something back with one Council that another Council voted for.

Singleton said the job was created through the job study personnel and Human Resources recommended the pay.

Mr. Winkle interviewed four people for the new position but Winkle was then asked to become the Police Chief and the position had not been filled. The department managed last year without hiring anyone, President Quakenbush stated.

Councilman Alexander said he voted against the position and Council was lead to believe during the Finance meeting that something would take place that did not.

Mr. Dudley said line item 112, 151 and 135 were not discussed and he requested to discuss items removed.

President Quakenbush said this was discussed during the Finance Committee meeting with Ms. Maggie Cox, Sheriff Secretary and it was turned down.

Mr. Dudley said it wasn't turned down but she was told to come back before Council if she found money from another line item. Sheriff Dudley said they are working within the approved budget.

Ms. Cox said 60% of longevity was rolled in the amount of the request. Ms. Cox came up with the money to support the transfer.

Quakenbush asked if this is to advance two employees.

Mr. Dudley and Ms. Cox gave explanation of the ranking system. These are not new employees.

Ms. Donna Patterson, Settlement Clerk, said the person that retired was replaced with a new employee. The longevity amount was \$1,990 and the new person's longevity is \$250. The new person is not getting currently getting paid the base pay, leaving plenty of money in that line.

## **COMMITTEE REPORTS**

Tax Abatements-Mid-West Metal Products

Ms. Traci Lutton, Interim Vice President for Economic Development presented information before Council regarding the request of the Tax Abatement of Mid-West Metal Products Co.

Mr. Chad Smith, CFO of Mid-West Metal Products Co. said the abatement will be to purchase new equipment. This is a retention project. Mid-West has two divisions. This is an investment for Mid-West Metal Products and will add to potential growth.

President Quakenbush pointed out that Mid-West Metal Products is paying \$99,000 in personal property tax. The purchase of the equipment is \$840,000.

Councilman Alexander said their past performance leads to his support and purchase of the new machine could possibly add jobs.

MOTION: Councilman Alexander made a motion to approve the Tax Abatement, Resolution 2017-003.

SECOND: Councilwoman Lasater MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY

Appointments -President Quakenbush said he spoke with Mr. Brian Pierce, House Authority Board about not attending the monthly meetings. Quakenbush said it was a misunderstanding and Mr. Pierce requested to stay on board.

AN ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS TO PURCHASE CRIME INSURANCE POLICY

WHEREAS, the fiscal necessities and well being are paramount issues for the consideration by the County Council; and

WHEREAS, the County Council has a duty and responsibility to safeguard the funds of the County from criminal activity; and

WHEREAS, I. C. 5-4-1-18(d) requires that the County fiscal body (County Council) adopt and ordinance for the purchase of crime insurance policy.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE DELAWARE COUNTY COUNCIL that:

- The Board of Commissioners are hereby authorized to purchase a crime insurance
  policy as either a rider, extension of the current general liability insurance policy or
  a standalone policy which:

   Provides coverage for criminal acts or omissions committed by;
   Is endorsed to include faithful performance to cover the faithful performance
  of and

  - of; and
    c. Includes the aggregate coverage sufficient to provide coverage amounts
    specified for;
  - All officers, employees, contractors, commission members, and persons acting on behalf of Delaware County and required to file a bond with the County for services rendered.
- The sole purpose of the insurance crime insurance policy shall be for recovering public funds on behalf of Delaware County, Indiana.
   The State of Indiana shall be named as an additional insured on all crime insurance policies obtained by the Board of Commissioners and any endorsements thereto.
   This ordinance is effective upon adoption.

DELAWARE COUNTY COUNCIL

**ORIGINAL** 

AN ORDINANCE DEFINING TERMS AND ESTABLISHING PROCEDURES FOR HIRING AND IMPLEMENTING SALRIES FOR COUNTY EMPLOYEES (EXCLUDING MERIT OFFICERS)

WHEREAS, the Delaware County Council ("Council") has the responsibility to fix the compensation of the officers, deputies and other employees, both full-time and part-time ("Employee or Employees"), payable from the Delaware County General Fund, Highway Fund, or any other fund from which the County Auditor issues warrants for salaries or other compensation; and

WHEREAS, the Council has approved salaries for County employees for calendar year 2017; and

WHEREAS, the Council desires to provide direction on the assignment and implementation of said salaries; and

WHEREAS, the Council further desires to establish uniform procedures for the hiring of Employees consistent with the Delaware County Employee Handbook adopted by the Delaware County Commissioners and the policies followed by the Delaware County Human Resource Director; and

WHEREAS, the Council intends that this Ordinance will repeal and replace prior ordinances relating to this subject matter, specifically Ordinances 2008-005, 2008-034 (2007-021B), 2010-008, 2012-014A, 2012-015A, 2013-022, 2013-030, 2015-013, 2015-014, 2016-011 and 2016-018; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Delaware County Council as follows:

Section 1. Definitions. For the purposes of this Ordinance, the following terms are defined as:

- a. Job Grade the numerical (or other) classification assigned to a particular job by the Human Resources Committee of the Council based upon its description and duties for the purpose of establishing its salary under the current salary ordinance.
- Grade Demotion -- a current Employee transferring to a job with a lower ranked Job Grade.
- c. Grade Promotion a current Employee transferring to a job with a higher ranked Job
- d. Lateral Grade Transfer a current Employee transferring to a job with the same ranked Job Grade.

# **AUDIENCE COMMENTS**

Councilwoman Lasater asked if her vote on 911 position scuttled the discussion. Lasater said this was not her intention.

Quakenbush said it failed 5/2. Quakenbush said "you" have the ability to bring it back on the floor for discussion.

Councilwoman Lasater said she remembered this had been a struggle during budget time.

MOTION: Councilwoman Lasater made a motion for reconsideration of the transfer agenda, item #1 to reconsider line item 137 on the Treasurers department.

SECOND: Councilwoman Piper

YEAS: Councilman Alexander, Councilwoman Lasater, Councilman Quakenbush, Councilwoman Piper, Councilman Bledsoe

NAYS: Councilman Matchett, Councilwoman Chambers

Councilman Bledsoe said where he struggles with this is how the game is played, that part of the element will never change; however, Bledsoe said his responsibility, as Councilman, is not to go backwards to discuss or vote on something that a previous Council already voted on. There are always differences and opinions on a political hire but as a Councilman it is none of "my" business who "you" hire. It is my business to fund your budget and then "you" operate within that budget. There was three months of discussions on this topic and it was already approved during last year's budget.

President Quakenbush said he made another proposal at the Finance Committee meeting to Mr. Paul Singleton, in which, the salary be reduced to \$29,000. This was turned down by Mr. Paul Singleton.

Councilman Bledsoe said why not hire ADP to do payroll, since everyone has problems/struggles doing payroll. Maybe this should be reviewed as a whole for the county. This is a discussion that Council should be having with the Commissioners. As a Councilmember, we give the departments a budget and they work with it. This is not a political or a personal issue.

Councilman Alexander said it is not a political issue/move and the prior Director did not state the correct information pertaining to the position. This position is not a necessary position. There was an employee already being paid \$5,000 for doing payroll. Payroll is the issue and not based on the job description created.

Mr. Steve Craycraft, County Auditor said the Auditors office is responsible for payroll. Each office holder submits their employees pay to the Auditors office. Each department (including 911) should do their own payroll and this should not be contracted out. They (911) wanted the new position, but Craycraft said he does not know how they came up with the salary. New time clocks have been purchased and once the clocks are implemented this will submit the payroll to the Auditors office. At this time the Highway and EMS already uses timeclocks. This is a statutory responsibility of an office holder. The Auditors office pays the invoices/bills.

President Quakenbush said Mr. Gary Campbell will not qualify for the position according to the job description provided and very few people will. If everything stays the way it is and that employee goes in as a new employee after leaving a constitutional office, it has to be handled 90% for 90 days and follow procedures from the handbook. There is an alternative to reduce the salary and revert it back to the general fund. The \$4,000 was a way to get this on the table.

Councilman Alexander said the position is not needed.

The Commissioners purchased new timeclocks for \$20,000. Once the new payroll system is up and running it will interact with the new payroll system. Jail and 911 has struggled with the changeover.

President Quakenbush said in his opinion that job was created for the Director to have an Assistant if/when he was not around. Quakenbush said Mr. Charlie Richmond said there would not be a payroll problem if everyone would use the clocks.

Councilwoman Lasater asked why there is a struggle with the timeclocks.

Mr. Craycraft said the Commissioners believe that they run 911, 911 Board believe they run 911 and the employees are contracted through the Commissioners. Three entities are trying to run one business and

this does not work. The county contract does not mention the 911 Board. Mr. Singleton is in a bind due to this matter.

Councilwoman Chambers said this was discussed during budget hearings and the job description was provided. This was approved in the budget hearing in October 2016 for budget 2017. It was voted on and it should be discussed during budget time next year. Councilwoman Chambers said this topic seems to be speaking of the individual other than the position.

Councilwoman Lasater said if the position is eliminated payroll will get done, Lasater guaranteed. Lasater said she understands what the personal feelings toward Council will be and this isn't as much of a concern as the legal recourse.

Mr. Hughes said anyone can sue. Council has authority to determine salaries and establish to eliminate positions.

Councilman Matchett said he would rather have this to come up during budget time.

Continued discussion took place.

Ms. Patterson said through February 1, 2017, (end of pay period) an amount of \$2,944 needs to stay in the account. That is what will be earned as of February 1, 2017.

Councilwoman Lasater confirmed that the position is a new position and not a transfer with no vacation, longevity and the pay is \$33,278. Lasater said when she hired her Chief Deputy she started at 90%.

President Quakenbush suggested a motion is stated that line item 137 in department 124 have \$30,334 reduction of appropriation and reverted back to general fund. Quakenbush said \$4,000 is not being voted on, it is already dead.

MOTION: Councilman Lasater withdrew the motion to reconsider the transfer.

SECOND: Councilwoman Piper MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY

MOTION: Councilman Alexander made a motion to item 137 in department 124 have \$30,334 for

reduction of appropriation and revert back to general fund.

SECOND: Councilwoman Piper MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY

This will eliminate the position, leaving enough for pay up through February 1, 2017.

Councilman Matchett said "for the record" and a fact is this employee will do nothing but payroll. Matchett said he is going with the job description that the department head provides.

President Quakenbush said by eliminating the position it is saying they have been doing okay without it and Council have changed their mind.

President Quakenbush and Councilwoman Lasater talked about RIF.

# PRESIDENTS REMARKS

President Quakenbush said a letter will be sent to liaisons regarding their Council contacts. Quakenbush met with several department heads, appointments, Mr. Hughes and others regarding what he wants to do the next year and educating himself. Councilman Chris Matchett will sit in on Finance and Regional Redevelopment meetings for February.

#### OTHER REMARKS

Mr. Jason Rogers, EMS/EMA Director gave an update regarding the grant process. Rogers will reach out to other counties to see how they are handling the procedure. Mr. Rogers gave an update on the Sprint/Nextel and said they are looking to close that contract soon. Rogers met with President Quakenbush and offered to assist with a shortfall on healthcare bills by transferring \$100,000 from capitol improvement fees.

President Quakenbush said a transfer of \$355,965 will be transferred for healthcare.

Ms. Donna Patterson, Settlement Clerk said due to a miscommunication, encumbrances will be presented to Council in February instead of January 2017. EDIT, Bridges and Highway are the largest encumbrances approximately \$ 7,000,000 with \$6,000,000 being the three items (EDIT, Bridges and Highway).

MOTION: Councilwoman Lasater approved encumbrances, as presented by Ms. Patterson.

SECOND: Councilwoman Bledsoe MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY

Ms. Melanie Marshall, Recorder announced that Tonne Winery will have WINOS (Woman in Need of Shopping), January 29, 2017 at 100 p.m.
