PRESENTATIONS TO COMMISSIONERS

UNITED WAY PRESENTATION

Ms. Pam McCammon, Human Resources, introduced United Way co-chairs, Ms. Elizabeth Ludwick, Mr. Damon Elmore and United Way President & CEO Ms. Jenny Marsh.

Ms. Marsh explained the Pathway to Success through United Way Funding and how it helps Delaware County. Ms. Marsh asks Delaware County Government to take part in the campaign.

President Riggin thanked Muncie Power Products for allowing two of their executives to lead the United Way Campaign.

AR Engineering / ABC-DG Plat

Ms. Maura Hoff, Attorney with DeFur Voran LLP, represented AR Engineering and stated that the real objection to the plat being considered was the identity of the tenant and lot size. The lot size meets the standards in code and it received unanimous approval from the Plat Committee. The right of way was the only thing that was not accepted as part of the plat. The action that came before the Commissioners was only acceptance of the additional 18 foot of right of way. Ms. Hoff said to deny the right of way, based on who the tenant may be, is contrary to Indiana law. Ms. Hoff asked that the Commissioners reconsider the motion of denial.

Commissioner Henry asked surrounding neighbors to speak of their concerns.

Mr. John Stevens, 7000 S. CR 300 W, Muncie, Indiana, said for CR 300 W, he is concerned due to the high volume of traffic, the narrow road, condition of the road, turn lanes, no shoulders etc.

Ms. Hoff said the developer is willing to remove any egress or ingress on 300W. The developer already has INDOT permits for Highway 67.

Mr. Don Hansing, 7005 S. CR 300 W, Muncie, Indiana, lives adjacent to the property. Dollar General is asking for a 15 foot easement, this would be 35 foot from Mr. Hansing's property line. The drainage basin and air conditioner would be so close to his property. Thirty landowners have signed a petition. He asked that the petition be entered into record. Dollar General is not a good fit for the area.

Petition was not presented to Auditor's office.

Mr. Andrew Rozelle, AR Engineering, said no variance will be sought in the revised plan, the discussion is regarding the right of way. This is a traditional layout, access from both roads. The developer is willing to remove egress and ingress on 300W, and per ordinance, they are here to discuss the acceptance of the right of way. On the matter of the opinion on the size of lot, this is within standards.

Mr. John Brooke, County Attorney, asked Ms. Marta Moody questions dealing with Dollar General and the plat.

Ms. Marta Moody, Director of Plan Commission, agreed that the official action at today's meeting is to accept the right of way. The Plat has been reviewed by the Plat Committee and the criteria stating what needs to be done to the plat drawing has been completed. In order for the plat to be approved, the right of way needs to be accepted by the Commissioners. Ms. Moody does not know of any "gift" standards that all gifts must be accepted. If the Commissioners accept this, then the plat would be approved and the project could be started. Ms. Moody said if the plat is approved, evidently no variances would be needed. Ms. Moody stated that in the subdivision ordinance, the adjoining property owners would be notified of the approval, they then would have the option to appeal the approval to the Plan Commission. The Plan Commission then would rehear the plat and make their decision. The approval of a plat with the requirement for dedication of right of way is absolutely the norm.

ORDINANCE 2019-016

ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 1-7-4 OF THE DELAWARE COUNTY CODE OF ORDINANCES REGARDING THE DELAWARE COUNTY TAX SALE FUND

WHEREAS, the Delaware County Board of Commissioners (the "Commissioners") previously established the "Tax Sale Expense Fund" for the purpose of creating a dedicated source of funds to be used to pay various tax sale-related expenses and to expedite contractual payments to vendors associated with the County's annual tax sales; and

WHEREAS, the Tax Sale Expense Fund, codified at Section 1-7-4 of the Delaware County Code of Ordinances, is funded with payments received by the County for tax sale fees assessed to tax sale buyers during the County's annual tax sales and property owners upon redemption; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners have determined a need to amend Section 1-7-4 of the Code of Ordinances to broaden the scope of tax sale-related expenses that may be paid for out of the Tax Sale Expense Fund; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners hereby desire to amend Section 1-7-4 of the Code of Ordinances to ensure that money in the Tax Sale Expense Fund may be used to pay all tax sale-related expenses in addition to those expenses related to contractual or professional services.

IT IS THEREFORE ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF DELAWARE COUNTY, INDIANA that:

1. Section 1-7-4 of the Delaware County Code of Ordinances shall be amended to state as follows:

"1-7-4. Tax Sale Fund.

- A. There is hereby established the Tax Sale Expense Fund. Said fund shall receive the payments received by the County from annual tax sales and deed sales from fees assessed by the County to cover advertising, abstract, and other necessary expenses including, but not limited to, contractual and professional expenses directly related to the County's annual tax sales and deed sales.
- B. Receipts shall be accepted at the time of the payment of taxes and expenses before, during, or after the annual tax sales or deed sales. The funds generated or received from fees assessed by the County shall be deposited in the Tax Sale Expense Fund and may be used to pay tax sale-related expenses upon presentation to the Auditor of a written claim form approved in the usual fashion by the Delaware County Commissioners.

- C. Payments made from the Tax Sale Expense Fund shall not require an appropriation by the Delaware County Council and shall be spent according to the general rules for which other funds of the County are subject.
- D. All amounts placed in the Tax Sale Expense Fund shall be invested and reinvested pursuant to the standard procedures followed by the County and amounts remaining in the Tax Sale Expense Fund shall not revert to the County General Fund at the end of the year unless so decreed by ordinance adopted by the Delaware County Commissioners."
- Any and all existing ordinances, orders, and/or resolutions, or any parts thereof, which may be in conflict with this Ordinance, are hereby superseded.
 - 3. This Ordinance shall take effect upon adoption and publication as required by law.

The timing of performance of each project and final approval of release of funds must be obtained by specific application to the Delaware County Board of Commissioners.

STATUS OF CAPITAL PROJECTS UNDER ORIGINAL PLAN:
Certain Capital Projects described in the Commissioners prior plans have been completed.

Under existing bond issues, EDIT revenues are committed at the annual amount of approximately \$978,000.00, payable in June and December of each year at the rate of approximately \$489,000.00 per payment. In addition, there is one final payment in the amount of \$30,600.00 due in December, 2013, to pay off the 2004 bond issue.

Mr. Rogers said Ms. Clark will propose an interlocal agreement and present it to Commissioners.

Mr. Paul Singleton, Director of 911, said as of August 19, 2019, Muncie Fire Department will be doing non-medical lift assist in the city of Muncie.

WSP AND HERITAGE ENVIRONMENTAL

Mr. Brad Bookout, Economic Development, confirmed with Commissioner King that only one meeting took place with Waetz Sustainable Products (WSP and Heritage Environmental). Due to the location of the facility being located within city limits, Mr. Bookout forwarded City of Muncie contact information to WSP. The county could not offer incentives and discussion no longer took place.

Commissioner King and Commissioner Henry agreed that since the company will be located within Delaware County, it is due diligence, as elected officials, to keep Muncie safe. Both Commissioner Henry and Commissioner King are seeking to set up a tour at the Alabama facility. They would like to meet with local officials, leaders, pastors and/or anyone wanting to be involved. Mr. Jammie Bane, Delaware County Health Director, should attend the meeting at the facility. More plant production information is needed. A venue is what the Commissioners would like and not a public hearing. Mr. Brooke will look into scheduling a meeting.

President Riggin said there was a tour of Heritage, WSP is not the same company and President Riggin does not agree that the Commissioners should go to Alabama since it is a city issue.

Mr. Bookout said any interested companies wanting to come into the county, an environmental questionnaire is required now. Another question/concern will be what these companies could do concerning brownfields.

Mr. Robert Jesse, Highway Superintendent, provided information about paving. Due to the rain, this has been a tough year. Chip and Seal is being done and the new paver is working well.

President Riggin asked about farmers breaking culverts end. Could a post be placed up?

Ms. Moyer said a claim would be filed then due to damage of their vehicles.

Mr. Jesse agreed that they would run over the post too. The biggest problem is corn stalks and bean stubbles. There should be an ordinance in which a barricade around the pipe should be placed by the farmer to discontinue the problem.
