IDEA CONFERENCE – HEATHER WILLIAMS

Ms. Heather Williams, Ball State University presented information about IDEA Conference. The third annual Neighborhood I.D.E.A. Conference is scheduled for March 2, 2019, 9:00-3:30 pm on Ball State's campus. Over 100 of Muncie's most active local leaders will gather to listen, learn, and meet like-minded individuals to share ideas. Ms. Williams asked that the Commissioners take part in promoting and getting the word out to Muncie residents.

**JUVENILE COURT, JUVENILE PROBATION, AND CASA INTERNET CONNECTIVITY ISSUES
BULLET RESISTANT MATERIAL FOR JUDGES' BENCHES / JUDGE KIM DOWLING**

Judge Kim Dowling, thanked the Commissioners for providing security equipment at Juvenile Court. Ms. Dowling told the Commissioners that they are in need of adding bullet resistant material for Judges' benches at Juvenile Court, Probation and CASA. An estimate is expected soon, but Ms. Dowling said approximately \$3,000 is what she expects the cost to be.

Judge Dowling said internet connections in Juvenile Court is a must and very important to run the courts efficiently. Several times it has completely gone out for days. Parts are obsolete due to the age of the equipment. Currently there are no fees to pay for the cost of the requested updates.

Mr. Jim Flook, IT Director, spoke regarding options to the problem/situation (see attached). Four solutions have been provided to the Commissioners. Mr. Flook recommended Comcast for a one-time cost of \$700 and \$216 monthly charge. Point to point is vulnerable to environmental conditions such as lightning and could take a couple of days to get someone onsite to repair.

The cost will be added into the Courts 2020 budget.

Judge Dowling will get a price on the bullet resistant material and send to the Commissioners for review.

RESOLUTION NO. 2018-013

**RESOLUTION OF THE DELAWARE COUNTY REDEVELOPMENT COMMISSION
PLEDGING TAX INCREMENT**

WHEREAS, the Delaware County Redevelopment Commission ("Commission") has created the Nebo Road Economic Development Area ("Area") and two allocation areas, which boundaries are coterminous with the Area; and

WHEREAS, the allocation areas contain parcels within the County ("Allocation Areas") for which the Commission created and adopted an economic development plan ("Plan"); and

WHEREAS, the Commission currently receives revenue from property tax increments on property located within the Area known as Nebo Road TIF No. 2, some of said revenue will be pledged by the Commission to assist with the replacement of the Nebo Road/York Prairie Creek Bridge as described in Exhibit A, attached hereto (the "Project"), which Project will serve and benefit the Area; and

WHEREAS, in order to help offset the costs related to the bridge replacement, which is necessary to improve bridge safety and address increased vehicle loads resulting from the additional development projects within the Allocation Areas, the Commission is pledging an amount not to exceed Four Hundred Ten Thousand and 00/100 Dollars (\$410,000.00) in TIF revenues from its Nebo Road TIF No. 2 (the "TIF Revenues"); and

WHEREAS, the Commission believes that it will be of public utility and benefit to pledge the TIF Revenues generated from the Allocation Areas to the County and such pledge will help further the accomplishment of the Plan.


IT IS NOW, THEREFORE, ORDAINED AND RESOLVED BY THE DELAWARE COUNTY REDEVELOPMENT COMMISSION THAT:

1. The Commission hereby finds that the pledge of TIF Revenues to the County for the Project will serve and benefit the Area, help accomplish the Plan for the Area, and promote economic development within the County and the Area.
2. The Commission further finds that the pledge of TIF Revenues to complete the replacement of the Nebo Road/York Prairie Creek Bridge will increase the marketability of the Area by increasing accessibility while also improving bridge safety and logistical support to property within the Area.
3. The Commission also finds that these improvements will serve and benefit the Area by increasing the likelihood of private development, adding employment opportunities, and generating economic prospects within the Area.

4. This Resolution shall be deemed to take effect immediately upon its passage by the Commission.







ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT INCOME TAX
CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PLAN
OF DELAWARE COUNTY
JULY 1, 2016 THROUGH JUNE 30, 2019**

ORIGINAL

INTRODUCTION:

This Plan is intended for adoption by the Board of Commissioners of Delaware County in conformance with I. C. Section 6-3.5-7. It is intended to supplement the Commissioners' previous plans. The term of this Plan is for three years, from July 1, 2016 through June 30, 2019. This Plan will cover only the projects for which distributions have been certified. This Plan should not be considered as final approval for expenditures on any of these specific projects. The timing of performance of the project and final approval of release of funds must be obtained by specific application to the County Commissioners.

STATUS OF CAPITAL PROJECTS UNDER ORIGINAL PLAN:

In cooperation with the Delaware County EDIT Corporation Board and other entities, certain Capital Projects described in the Commissioners prior plans have been completed. Those projects included, among others, payment of principal and interest due on COIT bonds relating to the Delaware County Justice Center, construction of the Children's Home (now the Youth Opportunity Center), the Albany wastewater project, the Daleville water distribution and storm water systems, the Yorktown wastewater treatment plant, construction of the Juvenile Detention facility, and miscellaneous projects in Selma, Eaton and other towns.

BOND ISSUES:

Under existing bond issues, EDIT revenues are committed at the annual amount of approximately \$978,000.00, payable in June and December of each year at the rate of approximately \$489,000.00 per payment. In addition, there is one final payment in the amount of \$30,600.00 due in December, 2013, to pay off the 2004 bond issue.



This Economic Development Income Tax Capital Improvement Plan of Delaware County for July 1, 2016 through June 30, 2019 is adopted this _____ day of May, 2018.



2018 Presentation to the Delaware County Commissioners

I first want to thank all three Delaware County Commissioners for giving me the opportunity to serve as the Delaware County Veteran's Service Officer over the last 4 years. When I originally took this position, I came into this office with the idea of marketing veterans rather than being a stagnant desk keeper. In the past, Veteran Service Officers typically sat in an office and waited for veterans to find us in the vast, complicated, and often frustrating VA system. Now, with a more innovative and enthusiastic approach, we have been able to serve well over 4,000 veterans and their dependents over the last 4 years.

According to the latest US Census data from 2010, there are over 6,500 veterans living here in Delaware County. We believe this number has gone up due to the demobilization of military personnel worldwide and would like to extend our services to those who may not know who we are or what we do. If you are a veteran living here in Delaware County and have not had the opportunity to visit our office, we would highly encourage you to reach out to us by calling 765-747-7810.

Today, I would like to provide current stats and information to show what we've done in 2018 alone.

- We currently have 3 full time county employees: Veteran Service Officer Nate Jones, Assistant Veteran Service Officer Ray Waudby, and Education Specialist Ralph Smith.
- We currently have 11 work studies, which are paid by a federal VA grant program provided to full time veteran students.

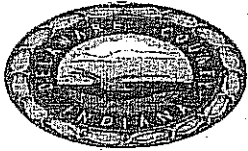

- Over half of our Delaware County Work Studies are seeking degrees in the Social Work field, giving them an opportunity to learn on the job skills while here at the Delaware County Veteran's Affairs Office: Brian Wilson, Josh Brown, Steve Stark, Troy Lenhart, Devin Hamilton, Les Kimbrell, Richard Benevidos, Stephen Philips, Matt Wilcox, Veronica Hamilton, and Jeremy Suave.
- One Work Assessment, which provides an opportunity to learn on the job skills through a similar program funded by another federal VA grant. His name is Tim Miller.
- We currently have 4 volunteers in our office: Dwight Fleming, Bruce Smith, Charlie Brooks, and David Swearingen.
- In addition to the seemingly endless stream of walk-ins, we have scheduled over 750 office visits with veterans and/or dependents alone. We went to 246 homes, including nursing home visits, and serviced well over 180 vets and dependents for educational opportunities.
- We helped advocate for a new, 28,000 sq. ft., 20 exam room facility that will provide more services like physical therapy and quicker mental health appointments. This facility does not currently have an opening date, but should be opened very soon.
- We conducted the largest Delaware County veteran's event to date, which now serves veterans throughout Delaware County and not just the city of Muncie. We serviced 143 veterans during the Delaware County Stand-Down and resource fair. We were able to get three veterans off the

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streets and into homes that were homeless. We also provided jobs to seven veterans to date from this event.

- A women veterans group has been established and has plans to grow throughout 2019.
- We started a donation fund to help in need veterans with issues such as rent, utilities, etc. We raised over \$12,000 for this cause.
- If any veterans in Delaware County are looking for routine, scheduled transportation to VA facilities, please contact John Reeder from our local AMVETS post for rides at 765-228-7041 or 765-283-8752. This organization has vans that give routine transportation on a daily basis.






